How to bring the whitewashed look home

The multistep refinishing process that Kevin used for his floors is not the only way to achieve a light-wood aesthetic. Whether you're building anew or replacing the floors you have, the variety of ready-made options is, well, flooring.

laminate

Although these planks have the appearance of wood, they are actually composed of multiple layers of materials (resin, wood fiber, paper) laminated together and printed with a picture of wood. Durable and easy to clean, laminates are a good choice for moisture-prone areas such as kitchens and bathrooms.

solid hardwood

Opting for real timber has its advantages. It adds value to a home, and the surface can be sanded and refinished many times, so you can alter the look of your floor without replacing it. Solid wood can shrink or expand with temperature changes, however, so proper care is critical.

engineered wood

With engineered products, thin sheets of wood are glued together in a crisscross construction to make the planks more stable. Unlike solid wood, these planks cannot be refinished in most cases; the top layer, called the veneer, may be too thin.
